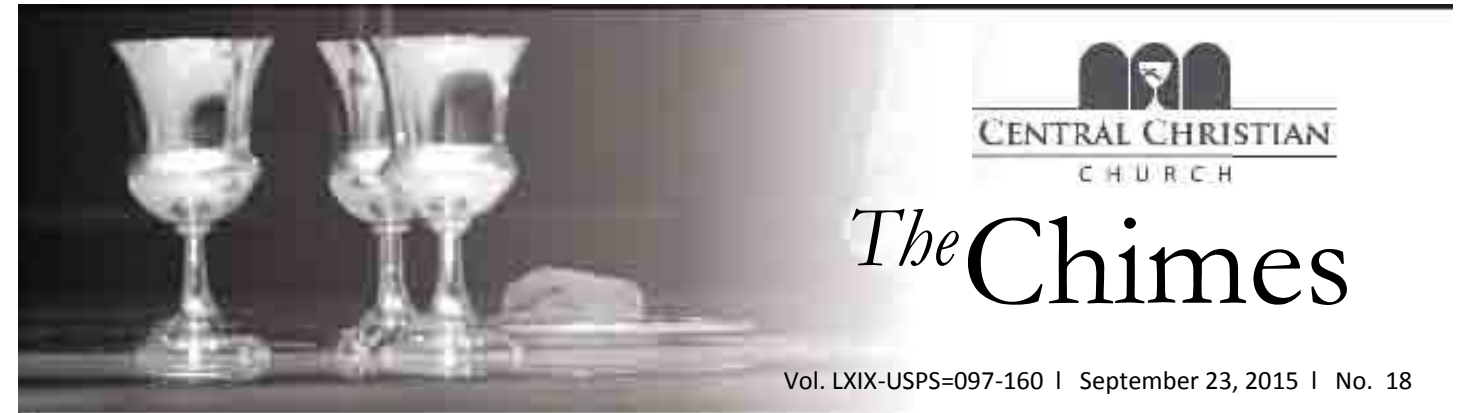
- * Seedleaf: September 16-October 7 - Hear about this important non-profit in the heart of Lexington that is making a difference in the areas of food and community.

Central's 33rd Habitat House is to be dedicated on Thursday, September 24, at 5:30 p.m., at 789 Burgess St. Built in cooperation with other Disciples churches in Lexington, this will be the home of Alexandre and Kashindi Lusembe and their four children. Alexandre and Kashindi are refugees from the violence in the Democratic Republic of Congo.

Months ago, I was scheduled to offer a lunchtime devotional on the second Friday of September. So it was that I went to the build site on Friday, September 11, the fourteenth anniversary of 9/11.

That morning, a colleague texted me that his morning devotional had been Psalm 11. It begins, "In the LORD I take refuge... for look, the wicked bend the bow, they have fitted their arrow to the string, to shoot in the dark at the upright in heart. If the foundations are destroyed, what can the righteous do?"

I asked the workers to share with one another what they were doing when "the foundations were destroyed" fourteen years ago. No one had difficulty remembering. We all remember days of destruction: 9/11. The Challenger explosion. The day JFK was assassinated. Pearl Harbor.

Alexandre recalled with vivid clarity where he was on September 11, 2001. "I was in a refugee camp in Africa," he said. He was fleeing for his life from the war-ravaged Democratic Republic of Congo.

After hearing Alexandre's story, I encouraged the Habitat workers to always remember this 9/11 when they put the final touches of trim and paint on a secure home in a safe place for a couple who had spent that "first" 9/11 in a distant refugee camp with no place to lay their heads.

The Psalmist asked, "If the foundations are destroyed, what can the righteous do?"



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Answer: The righteous can give themselves to pouring new foundations and building upon them, a bold and faithful sign that *construction*, not *destruction*, will have the last word.

All the workers said *Amen*, we broke the bread of lunch together, and went back to work.
